Topics in the Economics of Education

22 – 24 November 2021

Description

This course will cover selected topics in the economics of education. Topics will include empirical evidence on education inputs and outcomes, the human capital and signaling models of education, and estimating and understanding peer effects and teacher match effects. The course will focus on recent applied research, and each lecture will involve a discussion of one or two recent papers.

Instructor

Andrew Hill is a labour economist with primary research interests in the economics of education. He has worked in the areas of peer effects, teacher performance pay, and student-teacher interactions. Andrew completed his PhD at the University of British Columbia and his undergraduate studies at the University of Cape Town, and is now an Associate Professor in the Department of Agricultural Economics & Economics at Montana State University.

Format and schedule

This course will be taught over 3 days (22 - 24 November 2021). There will be a 1 hour lecture each day delivered via Zoom from 5-6pm (SAST).
